Access to highways consistently tops the list of factors corporate executives consider when looking to locate or expand a facility.

In the most recent Area Development survey of corporate executives, highway accessibility once again ranks as the #1 site selection factor, up from the #2 spot in 2015. The availability of skilled labor – #2 in the 2016 survey – was #1 in 2015. Highway access and availability of labor vie for the #1 and #2 slots year after year.

IKEA is not the only company to eye the newly reconstructed portions of I-94 North-South for site locations. Kenosha has seen many new facilities along the corridor, including an Amazon distribution center and Uline's corporate headquarters. And the German candymaker Haribo recently announced plans to build a new plant in Pleasant Prairie.
